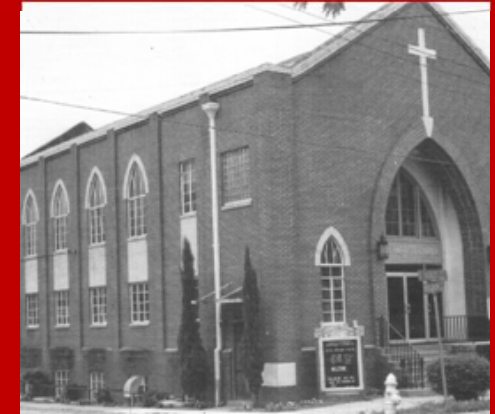

Holt Street Baptist Church: Birthplace of the Modern Civil Rights Movement

Dec. 5, 1955, the first day of the Montgomery Bus Boycott, thousands of Montgomery's black citizens gathered at Holt Street Baptist Church for the first mass meeting of the Montgomery Improvement Association, when Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his first address as MIA president, telling the crowd, "there comes a time when people get tired of being trampled over by the iron feet of oppression." This mass meeting launched the Montgomery Bus Boycott, that one year later ended segregation on public transportation.
